

## CURRICULUM POLICY

- The School provides all children of compulsory school age with full time supervised education appropriate to their age and aptitude including those designated as ‘gifted and talented’ and taking account of those with specific educational needs through a broad and balanced curriculum, giving experience in the following areas (See Annex A & subject handbooks)

• Linguistic	English, French, German
• Mathematical	Mathematics
• Scientific	Science
• Technological	DT, Catering / Food Technology, ICT
• Human & Social	Geography, history, religious education
• Creative & Aesthetic	Art, drama, music, textiles

- The School places considerable emphasis in the core areas of English and mathematics from an early age in order that all children develop good speaking and listening and literacy and numeracy skills.
